

The medallion is awarded annually for outstanding contributions in the field of children's literature. Silver medallions are cast for the recipient, for the president of The University of Southern Mississippi, and for the de Grummond Children's Literature Research Collection's permanent display. In addition, a number of bronze medallions are cast, and are available for purchase during the festival.

WORKSHOP LEADERS

BRIAN ALDERSON

Brian Alderson, a freelance writer and lecturer, and a children's book reviewer for the London Times, has worked in the field of children's literature for many years. He edited F.J. Harvey Darton's Children's Books in England (1983), as well as Andrew Lang's Fairy Book series. He is the author of several works, including Sing a Song for Sixpence, the English Picture Book Tradition, Randolph Caldecott (1986), and Arabian Nights (1992)



BERTHE AMOSS

Berthe Amoss was born in New Orleans in 1925, and attended Newcomb College where she majored in English Literature and art. She has attended art schools in Hawaii, Germany, and Belgium. She teaches children's literature at Tulane University, and publishes a column, "Reading, Writing & Children," that appears monthly in the Times Picavune. She has illustrated numerous children's books, as well as writing several novels for young adults, one of which received a scroll from the Mystery Writers of America. Her latest works are Old Hannibal and the Hurricane, published

in 1992, and Lost Magic, to be published this year by Hyperion.



NANCY ANDERSON

Nancy Anderson attempts to integrate teaching with children's books in all her classes, whatever the course subjects. In her position of associate professor of elementary education at the University of South Florida in Tampa, she teaches children's literature, reading, and language arts methods, and corrective reading. She also supervises preservice teachers in school settings, and is currently working on a presentation in emergent literacy, her primary area of interest. entitled "Developing and Assessing Emergent Literacy Through Children's Literature." She was awarded her

Doctor of Education degree from The University of Southern Mississippi in 1982, and has many happy memories of previous Children's Book Festivals.



BONNIE HOLDER

Bonnie Holder is a former elementary teacher, junior high school reading teacher, and Mississippi State Department of Education consultant. She recently retired from the Department of Curriculum and Instruction at The University of Southern Mississippi where she served as Coordinator of Undergraduate Programs. While at The University of Southern Mississippi, she published articles, made presentations at the state, regional, and national conventions, and conducted inservice sessions for area schools on issues related to reading methods and

children's literature. She is the current recording secretary for the

Mississippi Reading Association. She recently coauthored a book, Bookwebs: A Brainstorm of Ideas for the Primary Classroom, with Barbara LeCroy



BARBARA LECROY

A former elementary teacher children's librarian in a public library, and elementary school media specialist. Barbara LeCroy is currently the curriculum librarian for the College of Education and Psychology, directing the Gunn Education Materials Center and an instructor in Curriculum and Instruction at The University of Southern Mississippi, She conducts workshops in storytelling, and has been a member of the National Council of Teachers of English Storytelling Committee for the past eight years. She is a specialist in storytelling, curriculum and children's literature, and has made

numerous national, regional and state presentations. Bookwebs: A Brainstorm of Ideas for the Primary Classroom is the result of collaboration with Bonnie Holder, and it will be available later this year.

CHRIS VINSONHALER



Chris Vinsonhaler brings a wealth of experience to her multicultural work. A professional storyteller and school librarian, she is acutely aware of the relationships between "story" and children's development, as well as the array of challenges facing all children's services librarians. And her training in literature studies (M.A., English) and journalism enables her to broaden and deepen multicultural awareness in many forums. She has addressed the topic at the Mississippi Conference on African-American Librarianship and the National Association for Women in Psychology Conference, as well as the

1992 USM Children's Book Festival. She is also a regular contributor of articles and multicultural reviews for Mississippi Libraries.

LILLIE POPE

Lillie Pope is Educational Director of the Ezra Jack Keats Foundation and for the past three decades her professional career has focused on work with students with special problems. Author of several books. including Guidelines to Teaching Remedial Reading, Inventory of Basic Reading Skills, Sight Words for the Seventies, and Psycho-Educational Battery (P.E.B.), Dr. Pope is Director of Psycho-Educational Services at the Coney Island Hospital in Brooklyn, New York, where she has developed a Learning Disabilities Clinic, Dr. Pope has also served as Adjunct Professor at Brooklyn College of the City University of New York and continues to serve as a consultant to educational and mental health agencies.

Martin Pope

Martin Pope is President of the Ezra Jack Keats Foundation and was Keats' boyhood friend. Currently Professor Emeritus of Chemistry, Pope was Director of the Radiation and Solid State Physics Laboratory at New York University. Most of Pope's research focused on charge and energy transport in organic crystals, and on single anthracene crystals in particular. Although officially retired, he is still supervising a small but highly active group of experimentalists at the Laboratory.

OUENTIN BLAKE

The culmination of the 26th Annual Children's Book Festival will be the awarding of the 25th University of Southern Mississippi Medallion to Quentin Blake, a prodigious and creative contributor to the field of children's literature.

For over thirty years, Blake's original illustrations have illuminated his own original creations as well as collaborative works. His work has appeared in books by Roald Dahl, John Yeoman, Patrick Campbell, Russell Hoban and others, matching text with innovative, humorous drawings.


Blake was born in 1932 at Sidcup, England, and was raised there, the son of a civil servant. After national service, he attended Downing College, Cambridge, where he read English literature, graduating in 1956. Planning to be a teacher, he studied for a training year at the London University Institute of Education (1956-57), and taught briefly at the Lycee in London.

From earliest schooldays, however, Blake enjoyed drawing. He had published cartoons in Punch and Spectator. While teaching, he took part-time classes at the Chelsea School of Art under the tutelage of illustrator Brian Robb, leading him into freelance work and book illustration. His first illustrated book was A Drink of Water (1960), a collaboration with John Yeoman. His second was a collection of articles by humorist Patrick Campbell entitled Come Here Till I Tell You enlivened with Blake's original illustrations.

From that time on, Blake has proved to be a prolific worker with over 200 books to his credit. He is best known for his collaborative works, especially those with Hoban and Dahl, and has said about the process, "Collaboration must be teamwork, but it can be a funny sort of team. It's interesting to discover someone who is different from you, but with whom you feel a rapport and common sense of humor."

Blake was persuaded by Brian Robb into teaching graphic art, and he eventually succeeded Robb as Head of Illustration at the Royal College of Art in 1978. He offered the following advice to his students: "You must want to draw all the time because that is the only way you can get good at it . . . there are no rules. Everybody's got to find out for himself." He retired from this particular post in 1986, but was elected a Senior Fellow at the College in 1988. He was also appointed Royal Designer for Industry in 1981, and in 1988 he was awarded the Order of the British Empire.

Blake's children's books have received many prestigious awards. In 1974 he was the joint winner of the Whitbread Award for children's books with Russell Hoban for How Tom Beat Captain Najork. In 1981 he received the Library Association's Kate Greenway Medal for Mr. Magnolia. In the same year, and for the same book, he was honored with the award that pleases him most — the Federation of Children's Book Groups, which is actually awarded by children. To Quentin Blake, this is the most cherished recognition of his work. "What you win is not a medal or money, but a book filled with their own writing and drawing, all in response to your books. Quite a marvelous prize indeed!"




MILTON MELTZER

Milton Meltzer, distinguished biographer and historian, is the author of more than eighty books for young people and adults. Born in Worcester, Massachusetts, and educated at Columbia University, he has written or edited for newspapers, magazines, books, radio, television, and films.

Among the many honors for his books are five nominations for the National Book Award as well as the Christopher, Jane Addams, Carter G. Woodson, Jefferson Cup, Washington Book Guild, Olive Branch, and Golden Kite awards. Many of his books have been chosen for the honor lists of the American Library Association, the National Council of Teachers of English, and the National Council for the Social Studies.

The Jefferson Life is the latest of eighteen biographies, which include such subjects as Columbus. Washington, Franklin, Mark Twain, Langston Hughes, Mary McLeod Bethune, and Dorothea Lange.

Meltzer and his wife, Hildy, live in New York City. They have two daughters, Jane and Amy, and two grandsons, Benjamin and Zachary. Mr. Meltzer is a member of the Authors Guild.




BARRY MOSER

Barry Moser is recognized as artist, author, book designer, print maker and lecturer. He has won numerous awards for his work, including the American Book Award for Design and Illustration. The many books for children and adults that he has illustrated include Jump! The Adventures of Brer Rabbit, Little Tricker the Squirrel Meets Big Double the Bear, The Magic Wood, Prayers from the Ark and Messiah. He retold and illustrated Polly Vaughn, a traditional English ballad. Moser has received critical praise for The Tinderbox, the first tale he both adapted and illustrated.

Barry Moser lives with one of his three daughters, Madeline; a Rottweiler named Roosevelt; and a Samoyed named Woodrow on a hill overlooking the Pioneer Valley of western Massachusetts.





ANITA MOSS

Anita Moss is a Professor of English at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. Active in the Children's Literature Association and editor of Children's Literature in Education. Moss is the author of numerous articles, reviews, and book chapters about children's literature. She is co-editor of The Family of Stories: An Anthology of Children's Literature and is working on a biography of E. Nesbit for the Twayne English Authors series. She is best known as a critic and lecturer, but she also enjoys storytelling and writing about children's literature.

JAY STAILEY

Jay Stailey came to Texas on the first day of December in 1975, fleeing in the wake of Ohio's first winter storms. His intention was to make Texas his winter home, heading west at the first sign of spring. However, Jay found the people, climate, and spirit of Texas too compelling to leave and decided to make his home on the Texas Gulf Coast. After a brief stint running heavy equipment, Jay took a job with the Houston Public Library as resident storyteller on the HPL's Children's Carousel. His storytelling hasn't stopped since. He has worked in elementary schools in Texas and South America as a teacher, librarian, and administrator, and has traveled throughout North and South America, Europe, and Asia. He tells tales collected from those travels, his work, and his childhood days in the midwest. His stories are often spiced with singing and guitar accompaniment, a pinch of juggling, and maybe even a spin on a unicycle. Jay lives with his wife and two daughters on the island of Clear Lake Shores.



LIZ ANN BARBER

Liz Ann Barber has captivated audiences for years with her graphic work. Her posters and logo designs, illustrations and covers for numerous magazines and publications are renowned. She designed the Richard Peck USM medallion and the 25th Anniversary logo for the Children's Book Festival. An honor graduate of Mississippi State College for Women and

fifth-generation Mississippian, Barber has lived in Hattiesburg for eighteen years. Her primary motivation in her art work and teaching is to reveal the richness. variety, and delight of our shared heritage.

JUDY BULLOCK




A freelance writer to whom writing in southern drawl comes naturally, author Judy Bullock has lived in south Mississippi throughout her life and in McComb since 1968. She graduated with honors from The University of Southern Mississippi with secondary and elementary education degrees and a reading specialist certificate. While teaching first grade in

McComb, Bullock discovered a desire to write. "I read aloud to my children to help them explore the world of literature," she said. "Then I wrote a book for and about my class. They loved it and I was hooked."

Born and reared near Bainbridge, Georgia, in an antebellum home built by her grandfather, Elizabeth Bowne currently resides in Hattiesburg and teaches creative writing at U.S.M. Ms. Bowne attended Queens College, Columbia University, and New York University. She is the author of two adult books and numerous articles which reflect her broad interests. Her latest book,

Cocha, is a children's book set in Peru. Bowne is active in many international humanitarian efforts.







SYLVIA AND BOB HUBBARD

Hattiesburg author and photographer, Sylvia and Bob Hubbard, after almost a year of state-wide research, have assembled a collection of true Mississippi ghost stories into a unique book called Ghosts!

Sylvia has written in a straightforward manner the stories as they were related to her, while Bob has photographed areas where the supernatural phenomena most often occur.

Graduates of The University of Southern Mississippi. the Hubbards have lived in Hattiesburg for over twenty years.

Sylvia Booth Hubbard, a native of Jackson, Mississippi, is a freelance writer whose writing credits include contributions to McCall's, Parenting, Mississippi Magazine, American's Civil War, and other national and regional publications.

Bob Hubbard, who moved to Mississippi from Ohio as a youth, owns a commercial photography studio in Hattiesburg and has photographs in the permanent collections of the Mississippi Museum of Art and the New Orleans Museum of Art, as well as in many other collections. His work has been published in Mississippi Magazine, The Rangefinder, America's Civil War, and many other publications.

BARNEY MCKEE

Barney McKee, along with his wife Gwen, established Quail Ridge Press, in Brandon, Mississippi, in 1978. When Barney retired from University Press of Mississippi in 1987, he devoted full-time to his own publishing company. Barney was on staff at University Press from 1971-1987, the last fourteen years of which were served as Director. Prior to his work there, he was Design Production Manager at LSU Press in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, from 1963-1971.

Barney is a native of Baton Rouge and a graduate of LSU and the American Academy of Art in Chicago. He and Gwen have three children and one grandchild.

QUENTIN BLAKE BIBLIOGRAPHY
