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Undergraduate Opportunity Spotlight: The Luckyday Scholarship

Frank R. Day, former chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Trustmark National Bank, had a desire to help young people succeed. Mr. Day's Luckyday Foundation, the result of this desire, funds the Luckyday Foundation Citizenship Scholars Program at The University of Southern Mississippi. The Luckyday program funds scholarships for Mississippi high school seniors who are exemplary student leaders and outstanding citizens committed to continued involvement in community service.

The scholarship provides 100 entering freshman with scholarships of \$2,000 per year with up to four years renewable. Each year, 100 freshmen scholarships are added and the previously awarded scholarships renewed, provided recipients continue to meet eligibility criteria. When fully funded, the program will provide annual awards to 400 students, in addition to 10 study-abroad scholarships. The Luckday study-abroad scholarships, which award \$4,000 annually for a scholar's choice of Southern Miss' study-abroad programs, provide an extra incentive for recipients to excel. The gift will provide more than \$800,000 annually to The University of Southern Mississippi, the largest gift in school history.

Luckyday Scholars are provided extra support and encouragement to help assure their academic success through a required Luckyday Citizenship seminar, which prepares scholars to be student leaders on campus and in the community. The course is designed to familiarize students with the Luckyday program

and the concepts of service-learning and community engagement. Scholars also engage in a University 101 study skills course, designated housing assignments to encourage a living/learning community, community service learning requirements, and many other opportunities. Some areas of service where students are involved include Forrest General Hospital, Habitat for Humanity, MS Reads, MS Mentors, Big Brothers Big Sisters, and local animal shelters.

The Luckyday Scholars greatly appreciate Mr. Frank Day for his generosity and endeavors to help young people succeed. The Luckyday Program provides an opportunity for scholars to expand their college experience while learning more about community service and engaging in lifelong commitments to serving the community.
