PICK UP YOUR SUMMER READS AT COOK LIBRARY

This summer when you are hitting the beach or heading off to your favorite vacation spot, don't forget to swing by the Popular Reading Collection on the first floor of Cook Library to grab a book or two for your trip.

Getting your books from Cook Library can save you a trip to the public library and the money you would have spent purchasing them at a bookstore.

The Popular Reading Collection contains approximately 1,000 books that include *New York Times* best-sellers and *Independent* best-sellers. Fiction genres include romance, mystery, horror, science fiction and many more. If nonfiction is more your taste, check out the latest self-help sensations, biographies, cookbooks and political commentaries.

The next time you are in Cook Library grabbing a cup of coffee or picking up a book for class, head over to the Information Services area outside of Starbucks and browse the Popular Reading Collection.

Since titles in the collection rotate every few months, there is always something new to read! Books from the Popular Reading Collection are checked out for 30 days and can be renewed.

The Civil Rights era of the 1960s had a profound impact on the history of the United States, and Hattiesburg and Palmer's Crossing were important centers of the Civil Rights movement in Mississippi. Hattiesburg was the largest Freedom Summer site in the state, with over ninety volunteers from out of state, 3,000 local participants, and nearly 700 Freedom School students. The headquarters of the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party and several Civil Rights organizations were all located on Mobile Street in Hattiesburg.

That time was recently relived through a display of original photographs from the University Libraries' collections. These photographs, taken by Herbert Randall during Freedom Summer in 1964, captured the events, lives and emotions of Hattiesburg during that critical time. The photographs were displayed as part of the *Hattiesburg Remembers the Freedom Summer of 1964* exhibit at the historic Train Depot in downtown Hattiesburg. The exhibit, sponsored by VISITHATTIESBURG™, the University of Southern Mississippi Libraries, the African-American Military History Museum, and the City of Hattiesburg, ran from February 4th through February 28th.

Approximately fifty of Randall's photographs were the main feature of the exhibit. An African



and Native American photographer, Herbert Randall was born in New York in 1936. In the spring of 1964, he was awarded the John Hay Whitney Fellowship for Creative Photography. Shortly after, he met someone involved with the Mississippi Freedom Summer Project in Hattiesburg. That meeting inspired him to use his fellowship to photograph Freedom Summer activities in Hattiesburg. Later, he donated these photographs (nearly 1800 of them) to The University of Southern Mississippi Libraries, and worked with the library's former archivist, Bobs Tusa, to produce a book featuring them. His work has been exhibited in the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, the Brooklyn Museum, and the Art Institute of Pittsburgh. In addition, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Museum of Modern Art, the New York Public Library, and

the Library of Congress contains photographs by Herbert Randall in their permanent collections.

Herbert Randall spoke at the opening reception, which was held on Saturday, February 7th. The reception also featured the Cotton Blossom Singers from Mississippi's Piney Woods School. More than 1,000 people visited the exhibit during the month of February. The response was so positive that the exhibit was extended until March 11.

The Herbert Randall Freedom Summer Photograph Collection is housed in McCain Library & Archives, along

with many other collections related to the Civil Rights movement. The photographs, diaries, letters, and other documents tell a story of ordinary people gathering their courage and doing extraordinary things to make a difference in the world. RELIVING THE JOURNEY: CONNECTING THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

Noted author, Louise Borden, presented an enlightening talk at the University Honors Forum on March 31, 2009. Borden, the author of *The Journey That Saved Curious George: The True Wartime Escape of Margret and H. A. Rey*, spoke to the audience about her lifelong love of books and libraries and how that love led to her own journey of discovering H. A. and Margret Rey.

Borden related her experience of uncovering an article in *Publishers Weekly* in June 1995. The article stated that H. A. and Margret Rey had escaped from Paris on bicycle on a rainy day in June of 1940. On their backs were the art and manuscript for *Curious George*. Borden mentioned her amazement at discovering the fact that the bicycle journey ended after a few days when the Reys were able to take a train through Spain and then a boat from Lisbon to Brazil.

Borden had majored in European history while in college, so the fall of France in 1940 was no surprise to her. She immediately got a map of France and traced the journey the Reys must have taken when leaving. From that moment on, Borden was determined to retrace the steps the Reys had taken to escape Nazi occupation.

Among the many contacts Borden made in attempting to uncover the Rey journey was Laylee Ong, the executor of the Rey estate. Dr. Ong directed Borden to the de Grummond Collection at the University of Southern Mississippi, where the Rey archive now resides.

All in all, Borden made several journeys of her own as she wrote the story of the wartime escape: Three trips to Paris, three to Hattiesburg, and travels through France in which she actually followed in the Reys' route. Borden pieced together the bicycle journey by translating Hans' tiny pocket diaries at the de Grummond Collection.

Borden's focus on the de Grummond Collection served to remind listeners of the significance of an archive. She cited the de Grummond Collection as one of the "guardians of the past," which is indispensable to historians and writers.

Coleen Salley Storytelling Endowment, a fund established by her family to celebrate her passion for children's literature and to ensure her continued presence at the festival.

The 2009 Book Festival also included a collaborative effort with the Hattiesburg Tourism Commission to provide trolley services to the downtown area, discounted dining for festival participants, and a special reception featuring the travelling exhibit *Storybook Look: Illustrations by Southern Artists*, displayed in the historic Saenger Theater.

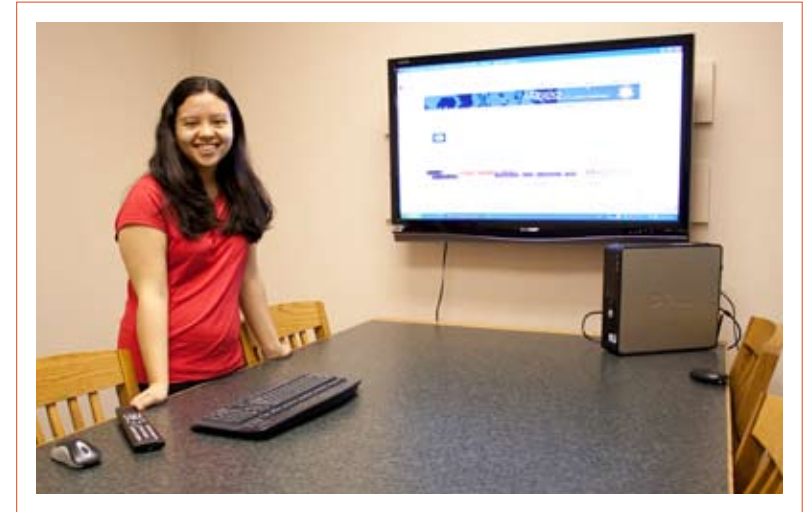

The Southern Miss Libraries are pleased to announce the beginning of a new book purchase plan with YBP Library Services of New Hampshire. The approval plan will provide us with books from university and other academic presses shortly after they are published.

This book selection and purchase plan will help insure relevant and more even subject coverage in the collections at both the Hattiesburg and Gulf Coast campuses. In addition, the consolidation of purchases through an approval plan brings the added benefit of cost-saving discounts.

The Libraries will receive weekly shipments of new books selected through the application of profiles for each academic area. The profile parameters were developed

by library bibliographers and department liaisons in cooperation with representatives from YBP by examining the teaching, learning, and research needs of each discipline.

The incoming books will be examined by bibliographers before adding them to the collections, and those determined not suitable will be returned for credit. The profiles can then be adjusted to fine-tune the selection of titles. The libraries look forward to offering our patrons more recent and relevant materials for their learning and research needs.

DISPLAY CELEBRATING DR. GORDON GUNTER ON DISPLAY AT GUNTER LIBRARY

Gunter Library begins its celebration of the life of Dr. Gordon Gunter, former director of the Gulf Coast Laboratory, by displaying a poster of a few of his many contributions to marine science.

Dr. Gordon Gunter (1909-1998) was the third director of the Gulf Coast Research Laboratory (GCRL). In 1972, the library at GCRL was named the Gunter Library by the Board of Trustees of the Institutes of Higher Learning. Dr. Gunter wrote over 300 scientific publications with 19 of those appearing in the prestigious journal, *Science*. He also founded two scientific journals and coined the phrase "fertile fisheries crescent." One of his publications, "Studies on marine fishes of Texas (1945)," has been cited over 200

times in the literature.

The poster was recently on display at the annual meeting of the Mississippi Academy of Sciences. Co-authors/creators are Madeline Trier-Rourke, a graduate library student at USM, Jonathan Weaver, honors biology intern from the Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College – Jackson County campus, and Joyce Shaw, Gunter Library head librarian.
