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
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
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2023 Fay B. Kaigler CHILDREN'S BOOK FESTIWAL

GENE LUEN YANG

2023 Southern Miss Medallion Recipient



Gene Luen Yang is the bestselling writer and artist behind *American Born* Chinese, Boxers and Saints, the Avatar: The Last Airbender comics, and many other iconic works. His latest graphic novel, Dragon Hoops, was released in March 2020. Gene began drawing comics in the fifth grade. His rise to prominence as a cartoonist began in 1997, when he received the Xeric grant for self-publishing for his Gordon Yamamoto and the King of the Geeks. After putting out several issues on his own, it was picked up by the independent comics publisher Slave Labor, who published it and Loyola Chin and the San Peligran Order (later collected into a single volume as Animal Crackers). While working on these comics, Gene received his master's degree in education from California State University-East Bay and began teaching at a San Francisco school. He is a founding member of the Bay Area's Art Night Crew, a local group of cartoonists. American Born Chinese, Gene's first graphic novel, was the first-ever graphic novel to be named a finalist for the National Book Award, causing a firestorm of controversy about whether graphic novels were eligible for the award, and whether they were "real books." The book went on to win the Printz Award, the ALA's award for the best young adult

book published that year, and an Eisner Award, one of the most prestigious honors in the comic book world. His follow-up solo graphic novel, Boxers and Saints, was also a National Book Award finalist and won the Printz Honor and the LA Times Book Prize for Young Readers. Currently, Gene is writing the graphic novel series Secret Coders, illustrated by Mike Holmes. This middle-grade series uses narrative to teach kids about computer programming. Gene is a strong proponent of using comics in education and of representing diversity through the comics medium, which he does in all of his comics work. He and Holmes were selected by the editors of Foreign Policy as two of the Top 100 Leading Global Thinkers of 2015. Gene was named the next National Ambassador for Young People's Literature by the Library of Congress in early 2016. He is the first writer who works primarily in graphic novels to be named ambassador. During his two-year tenure, Gene promoted Reading Without Walls, a platform he developed with the Children's Book Council and his publisher, First Second, that aims to excite young people about reading outside their comfort zones. In September 2016, he was awarded a fellowship with the MacArthur Foundation and the accompanying prestigious "Genius" Grant. A strong believer in collaboration, Gene has published books in partnership with esteemed cartoonists Derek Kirk Kim (The Eternal Smile, Duncan's Kingdom), Thien Pham (Level Up) and Sonny Liew (The Shadow Hero). His work has also been included in the anthologies Up All Night, Secret Identities, Strange Tales, Nursery Rhyme Comics, Shattered, Open Mic and Comic Squad: Recess. After speaking out against the lack of diversity in the casting of the Avatar: The Last Airbender movie, Gene was asked to write the Avatar: The Last Airbender comics, which he does to this day, as well as writing Superman (with John Romita Jr., Klaus Janson and Howard Porter) for DC Comics. 2023 Keynote Speakers



Linda Williams-Jackson is author of critically acclaimed, Mississippi-based historical novels, *Midnight Without a Moon, A Sky Full of Stars*, and *The Lucky Ones* (Common Sense Media Family Seal Selection 2022). Southern by birth and a Southern writer by the grace of God, Linda is plumpicking proud to still call Mississippi home. Born and raised in the Mississippi Delta in the teeny-tiny town of Rosedale, Linda Williams-Jackson likes to spin stories about everyday people in small-town settings. Though she has lived in a few other states (Alabama, Missouri and Kansas), Linda currently makes her home in a not-so-small town in Mississippi with her husband and three children. While a degree in math and computer science from the University of Alabama allowed her to enjoy a career in information technology as a database administrator and adjunct professor, Linda now prefers manipulating words rather than numbers and symbols. Besides her novels for young readers, Linda

has also written reading assessment passages for various educational publishers and is published in five *Chicken* Soup for the Soul titles.



Kyle Lukoff writes books for kids and other people. Before becoming a full-time writer, Kyle worked at five bookstores, in four libraries, for three schools, as two genders, through one intersection: people, and books. Kyle's middle grade novel *Too Bright to See* received numerous awards, including a Newbery Honor and a Stonewall Children's and Young Adult Literature Award. Kyle's picture book, *When Aidan Became a Brother*, illustrated by Kaylani Juanita, also received a Stonewall Children's and Young Adult Literature Award. Kyle's most recent books include *A Different Kind of Fruit, Mermaid Days*, and *If You're a Kid Like Gavin: The True Story of a Young Trans Activist*.



Vikram Madan grew up in India where he really wanted to be a cartoonist but ended up an engineer. Many years later, he finally came to his senses and followed his heart back into humor. When not making whimsical paintings in his Seattle studio, Vikram writes and illustrates funny books, including the award-winning poetry collections *A Hatful of Dragons*, *The Bubble Collector*, and *Lord of the Bubbles*. *A Hatful of Dragons* is being turned into a musical theater performance and is being released in India by Harper Collins India. Vikram has also written and illustrated the graphic novel series, *Zooni Tales*, and the early reader series, *Bobo & Pup-Pup*. His early reader book *Owl & Penguin* received a 2023 Geisel Honor and was recognized on the 2023 ALSC Notable Children's Book List.



Coleen Salley Storytelling Award Recipient



Amy Bruton Bluemel is a gifted storyteller and educator, artist and stomp dancer. Her appreciation for cultural awareness came at an early age. She was raised in a military family; she lived in Germany, Okinawa, Turkey and Scotland before returning to her Chickasaw roots in America. As the great-granddaughter of Eastman Kaney (an original Dawes Commission enrollee), Amy's a proud member of the Chickasaw Nation. She often performs with the dance troupe, Chikashsha Hithla, during nationwide tours. She shares Chickasaw customs (and those of other Southeastern tribes) with audiences of all ages through lively programs at schools and museums across the country. Amy was one of 36 Native American artists chosen to show and sell her art at the Smithsonian National Museum of the American Indian, Native American Art Market in Washington, D.C., in 2019. She also shows and sells her creations at powwows and festivals throughout the United States. Amy lives in Austin,

Texas, with her husband, Carl, and two daughters, who have also taken to Chickasaw culture and stomp dance.

The Coleen Salley Storytelling Award



The Coleen Salley Storytelling Award has been established to honor the memory of Children's Book Festival supporter, storyteller and children's literature advocate, Coleen Salley. Throughout her career, Ms. Salley worked tirelessly to promote quality children's literature and reading. Each year the award recognizes a storyteller whose mission reflects the ideals and dedication to the field that Ms. Salley personified. Angie Manfredi is a librarian, writer and editor. She believes that all youth deserve a right to see their world accurately reflected in the books they read, and that literacy is a human right. For the past 16 years, Angie has worked in public, school and special libraries. She is currently a middle school librarian and teacher in New Mexico, where she focuses on student voice and creating safe spaces for students to explore and grow. Angie

is the editor of The (Other) F Word: A Celebration of the Fat and the Fierce (Abrams 2019), the first fat positive young adult anthology. She has created curriculum supports and educational guides for Scholastic, Penguin Random House and HarperCollins and served on awards committees for the American Library Association, as well as the International Literacy Association, where she is currently a member of the International Literacy Association's Young Adult Book Award Committee. Angie is a proud alumnus of The University of Southern Mississippi, where she graduated from in 2007 with her MLIS.

From 2019-21, Angie was the Youth Services consultant for the State Library of Iowa. She provided continuing education, training and support around everything related to Youth Services for all 543 public libraries in Iowa in a job she genuinely loved and a position she excelled at. She chose to resign from that position after Iowa lawmakers passed a series of laws restricting free speech for government employees, a decision that she felt limited and curtailed her work. It was the hardest decision she has never regretted.

In her spare time, Angie enjoys writing snail mail, watching obscure world cinema, debating unsolved mysteries, trying regional sodas, and looking for adventure. de Grummond Children's Literature Lecturer



Loren Long grew up in Lexington, Kentucky, but he didn't catch the illustrator "bug" until his junior year of college. After years of taking every art class he could, he finally decided to become an illustrator after trying out four other majors (on his website, Loren cautions, "parents, be patient"!). Loren's career in illustration started off in the greeting card industry. Later, he spent roughly a decade as a freelancer, illustrating for popular publications such as *Sports Illustrated* and *Time*. Though he created several YA novel covers, Loren's entrance into the world of children's publications truly kicked off when he was invited to illustrate the wonderful *I Dream of Trains*, by Angela Johnson. Since then, he has written and self-illustrated a number of books, including the popular Otis series about a little red tractor who befriends

everyone from a calf to a kitten. His Otis series has been adapted into a delightful animated series, *Get Rolling With Otis* on Apple TV. Along with the extraordinary honors of illustrating books by Madonna, Barack Obama, Inaugural Poet Amanda Gorman, and Newbery Medalist, Matt de la Peña, Loren is a *New York Times* bestselling author. His caution for parents to be patient applies to us as well: we have been longtime fans of Loren's work, and we are so thrilled to finally welcome him to this year's Fay B. Kaigler Children's Book Festival as the de Grummond Lecturer.

The de Grummond Children's Literature Collection

Founded in 1966 by Dr. Lena de Grummond, the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection is the result of one woman's dream to collect original materials from authors and illustrators of children's books to use as resources for students in library science. Today the collection has grown far beyond its original intent and is now one of the largest such collections in North America.

While the collection has many strengths, the main focus is on American and British children's literature, historical as well as contemporary, and it holds original materials and published works in the McCain Library and Archives on the Hattiesburg campus of The University of Southern Mississippi.

The de Grummond Collection contains the works of more than 1,400 authors and illustrators, including Randolph Caldecott, John Newbery, Kate Greenaway, H.A. and Margret Rey, and Ezra Jack Keats. These are some of the most celebrated names in children's literature, with Caldecott, Newbery and Greenaway all having prestigious national awards named in their honor, and the Reys being the creators of Curious George.

Keats, the man behind *The Snowy Day*, is one of America's most groundbreaking authors, with his efforts to break the color barrier in children's publishing. *The Snowy Day* is considered to be one of the most important American books of the 20th century. The de Grummond Collection is the sole repository of the works of Ezra Jack Keats, holding original artwork, typescripts, dummies and preliminary sketches for 35 books by the Caldecott Award-winning author/

illustrator that complement the archives of his personal and professional papers.

The Ezra Jack Keats Foundation (EJK Foundation), in partnership with the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection at The University of Southern Mississippi (USM), will present the winners of the 2023 Ezra Jack Keats Award (EJK Award), along with four honor books, at the award ceremony on April 13, 2023, during the Fay B. Kaigler Children's Book Festival at USM in Hattiesburg, Mississippi. The annual EJK Award celebrates exceptional early career authors and illustrators for portraying the multicultural nature of our world in the spirit of Ezra Jack Keats.

"The spirit of Ezra Jack Keats can be found in all EJK Award and honor books, a spirit that reflects an ever-expanding definition of diverse children's literature," said Deborah Pope, Executive Director of the EJK Foundation. "This year's EJK Award winning and honor books provide inclusive stories about children with many shades of skin, children who happen to have Down Syndrome, children dealing with loss, children who live in the city or country, in the United States and abroad, and children having trouble sleeping through the night. EJK Award books entertain while opening children's minds and hearts. This year is no exception."

According to Ellen Ruffin, curator of the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection, "The de Grummond Children's Literature Collection is thrilled to encourage the creation of beautiful and engaging books for the diverse children of our country. It's an honor to work with the amazing members of the EJK Award committee, to celebrate these authors and illustrators, and together build a library in which children see themselves and others in the books they read every day."

Since its inception, the EJK Award has celebrated over 100 exceptional early career authors and illustrators for portraying the multicultural nature of our world, the universal experience of childhood, and the importance of family and community. Past winners include renowned bookmakers Oge Mora, Meg Medina, Christian Robinson, Bryan Collier and Sophie Blackall.





The Ezra Jack Keats Award is co-administered by the EJK Foundation and the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection at The University of Southern Mississippi. A distinguished selection committee of children's literature and early childhood education specialists, librarians, authors and illustrators review the entries and announce the winners and honorees on the second Tuesday in March each year.

Ezra Jack Keats (1916-83) is considered one of America's greatest children's book illustrators and authors. His first book, *The Snowy Day*, which he wrote and illustrated, was published in 1962 and awarded the Caldecott Medal, the most prestigious children's book award for illustration in the United States, in 1963. Keats went on to write and illustrate over 20, now classic, books, including *Peter's Chair, Whistle for Willie* and *A Letter to Amy*. He wanted no child to be an outsider. "If we could see each other exactly as the other is," he wrote, "this would be a different world."







The Fay B. Kaigler-Ruth Lamont Award

The first presentation of the Kaigler-Lamont Award was made in 1998. The generous financial support of Fay Kaigler of McComb, Miss., made the award possible. Miss Kaigler was well-known for her love of children and devoted herself for many years as an elementary school teacher to enhancing books and reading in the lives of children. Her students were soon hooked on books. In retirement, she continued to promote books and reading in her local public library. Her dear friend, Ruth Lamont, who for many years was a successful school librarian in Baton Rouge, La., shared her passion for making books integral to children's lives.

The Kaigler-Lamont Award recognizes distinguished accomplishments in promoting children's reading by librarians and teachers in Mississippi schools and by children's librarians in the public libraries of Mississippi.

This year's receipient is **Becky Bowen**, Youth Services Librarian at Madison Public Library in Madison MS.

The Magnolia Children's Choice Award introduces youth to current literature with a goal of instilling a love of reading. The award was established in 2010 and is a partnership between the Mississippi Department of Education, the Mississippi Library Commission, the Mississippi Reading Association, The University of Southern Mississippi's School of Library and Information Science, the de Grummond Children's Literature Collection, the Mississippi Children's Museum and the Mississippi Library Association.

Votes can be cast by Mississippi children in grades K-12. Children in public, private or homeschooled settings are eligible to vote. In order to be eligible to make the reading list

(and ultimately, perhaps, be selected by the children as the winner), the books must have been published within the past two years. Titles that have won a national award (i.e. Caldecott, Newbery, Sibert, Coretta Scott King, Pura Bulpré, National Book Award, etc.) are not eligible for the Magnolia Award, but honor books are, and either the author or illustrator must be living. Nominations may be done by the public and the committees, but final selection of the titles is determined by the committee.

The winning titles in each category are announced at the Fay B. Kaigler Children's Book Festival.

She has written books on leadership, several books of poetry, and a children's picture book–Pass It On!, which shares the story about her father, Earnest McEwen Jr. and his life-changing relationship with Nobel Laureate William Faulkner. She enjoys learning about new places and people and has travelled extensively in North America, Europe, Africa, South America and Australia. Gloria brings her passion for people and wealth of experience to her writing, workshops and speaking.

Sarah C. Campbell

Sarah C. Campbell is the director of programs and publications at the Mississippi Department of Archives and History. She has more than two decades of experience working in communications and is the author and photo-illustrator of three award-winning picture books for children. Her journalism degrees are from Northwestern University, and she has a degree in politics, philosophy and economics from Oxford University, which she attended as Mississippi's first woman Rhodes Scholar. Sarah and her husband, Richard, who is co-photographer on the books, live in Jackson, Miss.

Bethany Carlisle

Bethany Carlisle serves as president of the Magnolia Book Awards Executive Board. Bethany is the Youth Services coordinator for the Jackson-George Regional Library System, a position she has held for 12 years. Drawing for Kids

Steven Harper, Anime, Comics and Graphic Novels

This is a step-by-step "How To" drawing session for artists of all ages and abilities, led by author/artist/illustrator Steven Harper of Tikifez Comics. Join us for a fun and easy lesson on how to draw an outer space explorer on an adventure!

A Celebration of the Lee Bennett Hopkins Poetry Award for Children Karla M. Schmit, Poetry; Diversity, Equity and Inclusion

"Give children poetry. It is one of the best gifts you can give them...a gift to last a lifetime." Lee Bennett Hopkins This session will highlight the Lee Bennett Hopkins Poetry Award for Children administered by the Pennsylvania Center for the Book at Penn State. The legacy of Lee Bennett Hopkins (April 13, 1938-August 8, 2019) and his advocacy of children's poetry will be shared. Hopkins was a medallion winner at The University of Southern Mississippi Children's Book Festival in 1989. He was also the winner of the 2009 National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) Award for Excellence in Poetry for Children and in 2011, was recognized by the Guinness World Records as the world's most prolific anthologist of poetry for children. The Hopkins Poetry Award for Children began in 1993 with "Sing to the Sun" by Ashley Bryan being named the first winner of the award, and 29 titles later, in 2022, "The 1619 Project: Born on the Water" by Nikole Hannah-Jones and Renee Watson. Learn more about the Hopkins Poetry Award, the winners and honor books—come away wanting to share poetry and enrich the lives of students, family and friends of all ages.
